

Trainee abstract submission invitation for the NCRI Colorectal Trials Meeting 2019

Aimed at: Trainee specialist registrars on clinical or academic pathways in any subspecialty, on a topic on any aspect of the diagnosis, treatment, screening or prevention of colorectal cancer. The submitted abstract should consist of work that is substantially that of the trainee, which can include work on an aspect of a larger clinical trial (which would need to be identified with the registry number if applicable). A panel originating from the NCRI Colorectal CSG and Subgroups will assess the submitted abstracts and the three best abstracts will be invited for oral presentation on the day of the Colorectal Trials Meeting on 22nd March 2019. An overall winner will be selected and prize presented on the day.

Contact Information: Provide the trainee's full name, academic degree(s), institution, address, and email address. As the first author, the trainee will receive future correspondence from the Meeting Secretariat regarding the status of their abstract.

Funding Source: If the study has been funded, please indicate the funding source(s).

Abstract Title: The title should objectively describe the study. Do not refer to study results or conclusions.

Coauthor(s): Full agreement of co-authors must be obtained prior to submission of the abstract. Provide the full name and institution address. You may list up to 6 individual authors for each abstract.

Disclosure Declaration: Relevant financial interests and other relationships, and potential conflicts of interest must be declared by all authors during submission, including disclosure of relationships with for-profit health care companies.

Abstract Body/Table: The body of the abstract should describe the **Background, Methods, Results, and Conclusions** of the research. A maximum of 2,000 characters (approximately 300 to 350 words) should be used for the total of the abstract title, body including section titles, and table. The character count does not include spaces or author names or institutions. One data table is permitted per abstract, which should be limited to no more than 10 rows. Illustrations and figures are not permitted.
